

NEW MOTRS ADDED for AY 2022-2023

HUMANITIES AND FINE ARTS

MOTR LITR 107: Introduction to Shakespeare: This course is an introductory survey of the major works of William Shakespeare. The course will focus on the language, dramatic structure, narrative themes, and historical context of his work. (3 transfer credits)

MOTR HUMN 100: Introduction to Humanities: An Overview of the history and philosophy of human culture, emphasizing the major periods and works in the visual arts, music, literature, theatre, and architecture. (3 transfer credits)

MOTR OCIV 101: World Civilizations: Survey of the development and progress of a regional civilization. Topics may include the evolution of societies and changes in political organization, religion, artistic expression, and daily life in a regional civilization. Examples may include, but are not limited to, Asian Civilization, African Civilization, Latin American Civilization. (3 transfer credits)

MOTR PHIL 102A Introduction to Applied Ethics: A study of ethical dimensions of social justice as they have appeared in Western culture. Selective applications of these principles to contemporary ethical-political issues such as racism, sexism, classism, ageism, and/or other issues. (3 transfer credits)

SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES

MOTR SOCI 203: Introduction to Gender Studies: Introductory survey of the interdisciplinary scientific study of gender in the United States and globally. The personal, social, structural, political, economic, cultural, and historical processes that shape and are shaped by gender and sex are explored. Contemporary social issues related to sex and gender to include inequities, marginalization, and intersections with race, class, age, and sexuality will be evaluated. (3 transfer credits)

Minimum expected learning outcomes for equivalent courses will be developed with faculty within the first year of the creation of this MOTR.

NOTES: This MOTR is within the Social and Behavioral Sciences knowledge area of the MOTR CORE 42 as it most clearly develops the goals and objectives of this knowledge area. In addition to the knowledge area goals and objectives, courses equivalent to this MOTR support the development of competencies related to Managing Information, Valuing, Higher Order Thinking, and Communicating.

This MOTR is listed as SOCI but as an interdisciplinary study may be equivalent to courses from a variety of disciplines in the social and behavioral sciences. Equivalent courses are appropriate for students pursuing a variety of specific courses of study. Equivalent courses are not required to have another SBS course as a prerequisite but may do so as long as all equivalent courses are recognized equally in transfer.
